SUPPORT FOR NONPROFITS

- Nonprofits report that it is hard to find out about contracting opportunities, difficult to decipher jargon and unfamiliar terms, and challenging to get clarification
- Nonprofits will be considering, applying for, and/or accepting new funding opportunities that require substantial organization-level changes to finance, accounting, and grants management practices
- Nonprofits need an easily accessible and responsive program to support capacity building needs, at a large scale

Support urgent COVID-19 response efforts to decrease spread of virus and bring pandemic under control

Replace lost revenue for eligible recipients to strengthen support for vital public services and help retain jobs

Support an equitable recovery through immediate economic stabilization for households and businesses

Address systemic public health and economic challenges that have contributed to the inequal impact of the pandemic

Board-Approved Countywide Equity Guiding Principles

Reduce racial disparities in life outcomes as well as disparities in public investment to shape those outcomes.

Develop and implement strategies that identify, prioritize and effectively support the most disadvantaged geographies and populations

Authentically engage residents, organizations, and other community stakeholders to inform and determine interventions (e.g., policy and program) and investments

Seek to improve long-term outcomes both intergenerationally and multigenerationally

Use data to effectively assess and communicate equity needs and support timely assessment of progress

Disaggregate data and analysis within racial/ethnic and other demographic subgroup categories

Work collaboratively and intentionally across departments as well as across leadership levels and decisionmakers

Act urgently and boldly to achieve tangible results

Align policies, processes, practices to effectively address equity challenges throughout the County of Los Angeles' workforce (personnel, contractors and vendors)

Intervene early and emphasize long-term prevention





Additional ARPA-Related Equity Principles

Prioritize programs and services that reduce and close race and gender equity gaps and address root causes and drivers of inequity.

Prioritize ARPA resources and services in the highest-and-highneed geographies as defined by the **COVID-19 Equity** Index and disadvantaged communities nongeographically concentrated (e.g., American Indian, Pacific Islanders, and immigrant communities), and realign/reallocate existing investments as well to effectively target communities and individuals.

Adopt prevention and early interventionoriented approach to programs and services.

Ensure programs and services are accessible to disadvantaged communities without the fear of intimidation or judgment. Services must be accessible culturally and linguistically, near transit, regardless of immigration status and or past criminal history, inperson/over the phone and not just online, and during days and hours, individuals can access.

Lead with transparency and accountability.



Determining Readiness and "Fit"





The Government RFP

- Solicitation for proposals & Notice
- Contains everything you need to know (guidelines, funding total, award amount, deadlines, restrictions, required forms, submission instructions)
- One time vs. Recurring
- No single format to the RFP
- Issued throughout the year





Screening for Good Fit

Can I take the risk?

- Eligibility
- Your project vs. Contract focus
- Geographic reach
- The competition
- Contract amount/budget
- Your capacity/investment
 - O Commit staff/time/\$\$
 - Opportunity cost
- So what factor & who benefits

What if I succeed?

- Capacity to deliver the program
- Financial Impact: Is the program feasible for your organization
- Contract requirements & administration- manage & report
- Ability to comply & adjust
- Can I measure the result?





Risk Assessment/Mitigation

- Quick Funding Opportunity Assessment
- Detailed Funding Opportunity Assessment
- Bidder's Conference
- Program Officer
- Development staff/consultant







TIPS for General Readiness to Apply

- Read the entire RFP: Leap with eyes wide open.
- Have a general workplan & budget
- Commit the time and necessary resources.
- Pay attention to details.
- Follow instructions to the letter.
- Know how you are scored
- Assign a Point of Contact & and team to the project, when possible





Alternative Strategy

- Be a subcontractor
 - Funding with limited role and reporting
- Be a consortia applicant (co-applicant)

NOTE: You may not be the fiscal agent in these cases
